

More than 50 freethinkers from Algeria, Bangladesh, Belgium, Canada, Croatia, Egypt, Germany, Greece, India, Iran, France, Kenya, Kosovo, Lebanon, Morocco, the Netherlands, Nigeria, Norway, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Syria, Sweden, Switzerland, Tanzania, Turkey, Tunisia, UK, Ukraine, USA and the Diaspora are gathering to celebrate blasphemy, apostasy and freedom of expression through discussions, poetry, film, protest-art, comedy and music and pay tribute to taboo-breaking ex-Muslim comedian Shabana Rehman.

The two-day conference organised by the Council of Ex-Muslims of Britain and Dømmekraft is a continuation of the hugely successful Celebrating Dissent conferences held in London (2014), London (2017), Amsterdam (2019), Cologne (2022) and Paris (2023).

Oslo Hosts A Global Celebration **Of Human Rights And** Freedom

Oslo is the host city for an international event that shines a spotlight on freedom, secularism and challenges to the religious far-Right whilst paying tribute to Shabana Rehman.

Oven fifty nights activists from countries such as Inan, Bangladesh, Nigeria and Saudi Arabia will gather in Oslo during 31 August-1 September 2024 for Celebrating Dissent, the world's largest gathering of ex-Muslims. Oslo's hosting this year reflects the city's commitment to universal human rights.

This year's event is dedicated to honouring the late comedian and activist Shabana Rehman, a pioneer for freedom of expression in Norway. Rehman was known for her bold use of humour to challenge religious and cultural taboos.

Morten Guldberg who leads the secular think tank Dømmekraft which is co-organising the Conference with the Council of Ex-Muslims of Britain (CEMB) says: 'Shabana has inspired many and her influence will be central throughout the conference with sessions that reflect her work, legacy and importance.We look forward to gathering and celebrating brave voices from all conners of the world who risk everything to defend the right to oppose authoritarian regimes and religious oppression.'

Maryam Namazie, CEMB Spokesperson and the initiator of the Celebrating Dissent conferences since 2008. savs: 'In a world where the far-Right - be it Islamist, white nationalist, Hindutva, Jewish-Right... - normalise their politics of hate. unbridled violence dehumanisation. and creative dissent becomes an important vehicle for resistance, survival and humanisation. Women's dissent and blasphemy are especially crucial for breaking taboos. challenging racism. dogma and fundamentalisms, whilst appealing to our common humanity. Creative dissent responds to hate, violence and fear with humour and nonviolence and reimagines a world where nothing is sacred but the human being.'

Celebrating Dissent Oslo will serve as a vibrant platform for dialogue, featuring discussions and an array of artistic expressions, including poetry, film, protest art, comedy, and music.



Shabana Rehman was a renowned comedian and social commentator.

She was Director of Født Fri (Born Free) Foundation and a performance artist and human and animal rights advocate of Norwegian with Pakistani descent. Shabana entered the stage in Oslo, Norway in 2000. In the following years, she quickly built a reputation for groundbreaking and iconoclastic comedy. Her taboo - breaking comedy style included Mullah-Lifting and being bodypainted in the Norwegian flag. In addition to her prolific comedy career, Shabana was a highly respected columnist, satirist, and public speaker. She was awarded the Freedom of Expression Foundation Prize in 2002.

Rehman was among the speakers at the 2017 and 2019 Celebrating Dissent, and intended to speak in Cologne in 2022, but became too ill to travel and died months later.



Ahmedur Chowdhury (Tutul)

Ahmedur Chowdhury founded Shuddhashar FreeVoice in 1990, a platform for unconventional writers, and opened his printing house in 2004. Despite a machete attack in 2015 linked to his publishing efforts for secular authors, he continues to advocate for freedom of expression.



Aleem

Aleem is a journalist and filmmaker in Canada who left Islam at 18. Through his YouTube channel, 'Secular Spirit,' he challenges organised religion and advocates for the acceptance of life without faith. Aleem also shares ex-Muslim stories, aiming to normalise secularism and combat discrimination faced by those leaving their faith.



Ali A. Rizvi

Ali A. Rizvi is a Canadian oncologic pathologist, communications consultant, and author of «The Atheist Muslim.» He hosts the «Unlicensed Therapist» podcast, focusing on storytelling and secular activism.



Annie Laurie Gaylor

Annie Laurie Gaylor co-founded the Freedom From Religion Foundation and authored books like «Woe to the Women.» She is a dedicated feminist involved in numerous legal battles for secularism, currently presiding over the advocacy group FFRF Action Fund.



Apostate Aladdin

Apostate Aladdin is an agnostic ex-Muslim who began his online presence in 2021, discussing his deconversion journey. He strives to create communities for ex-Muslims, fostering understanding through dialogue while advocating for freedom and representation.



Arnfinn Pettersen

Arnfinn Pettersen is a Senior Advisor at the Norwegian Humanist Association, focusing on humanism's political aspects. He has edited anthologies addressing free speech and conspiracy theories.



Cemal Knudsen Yucel

Cemal Knudsen Yucel is a Turkish-born ex-Muslim activist, previously involved in Islamist youth politics. He now advocates for ex-Muslims' rights, participating in public discussions on Islam, women's issues, and social reform.



Dan Barker

Dan Barker co-presides over the Freedom From Religion Foundation and is a former evangelical minister. After declaring his atheism in 1984, he cofounded The Clergy Project and authored several books challenging religious dogma.

Einik Løkke works as a Fellow at Civita and hosts its podcast, «Liberal Half Hour.» With degrees in political science and history, he previously held various roles in education and political campaigning and contributes to Norwegian media.



FarAvaz

FarAvaz is a singer and women's rights activist from Iran who fled to Berlin after facing persecution for singing. Her provocative music combines pop and Middle Eastern elements, advocating for women's empowerment and featuring in major media.



Fariborz Pooya

Fariborz Pooya is an Iranian political activist and founder of the Iranian Secular Society, as well as a founding member of the Council of Ex-Muslims of Britain. He produces the TV program «Bread and Roses.»



Fauzia Ilyas

Fauzia Ilyas is a human rights activist and ex-Muslim who founded the Atheist and Agnostic Alliance Pakistan. After facing threats for her beliefs, she sought asylum in the Netherlands. She won the Atheist of the Year award in 2017.



Gita Sahgal

Gita Sahgal is a writer, journalist, film-maker and rights activist. She is a member of the editorial collective of the journal Feminist Dissent, Spokesperson for One Law for All and Produced 'Women Leaving Islam' for the Council of Ex-Muslims of Britain.



Halima Salat

Halima Salat is an investigative journalist from the Netherlands who came out as an ex-Muslim after moving from her believing community. She founded an online support group for ex-Muslims from the Somali community.



Haram Doodles

Haram Doodles is an initiative led by an ex-Muslim artist creating comics that critique Islam. She organised the first ExMuslim Awareness Month to highlight the experiences of ex-Muslims and promote freedom of expression.



Ibn Warraq

Ibn Warraq is an author known for Koranic criticism, with works exploring Islamic theory and secularism. He engages in public debates and has given addresses at prestigious platforms, advocating for rationalist perspectives.



Ibtissame Betty Lachgar

Ibtissame Betty Lachgar is a Moroccan clinical psychologist and activist against sexual violence and sexism. She founded the Alternative Movement for Individual Liberties, facing significant challenges due to her activism.



Inna Shevchenko

Inna Shevchenko is a feminist activist and Leader of FEMEN movement. Having faced threats for her activism, she advocates for women's rights and freedom of speech through public speaking and journalism.



Jenny A. Wenhammar

Jenny A. Wenhammar is a Swedish artist and FEMEN activist who opposes theocracy and advocates for women's rights through her art. Her works emphasise women's autonomy and challenge patriarchal norms.



Jimmy Bangash

Jimmy Bangash is a psychotherapist specialising in sessions for ex-Muslims and LGBT individuals. He advocates for awareness and support for these communities, and is spokesperson for Council of Ex-Muslims of Britain.



Khadija Khan

Khadija Khan is a journalist and broadcaster advocating for secularism and women's rights. As an editor and podcaster, she opposes blasphemy laws and highlights the challenges faced by women under religious frameworks.



Krystel Antoni

Krystel Antoni advocates for free expression and critical thinking in Lebanon and France, organising discussions and promoting digital liberties while fostering community engagement among young thinkers.



Lawrence M. Krauss

Lawrence M. Krauss is a theoretical physicist and author, known for his contributions to cosmology. Hosting the Origins Podcast, he educates the public on science and secularism through various media outlets.



Mariam Oyiza Aliyu

Mariam Oyiza Aliyu is a women's rights defender and founder of LETSAI, dedicated to supporting survivors of violence in Northern Nigeria and advocating for women's empowerment.



Marieme Helie Lucas

Marieme Helie Lucas is an Algerian sociologist and feminist activist focused on women's rights. She founded several international networks promoting secularism and solidarity against fundamentalisms.



Maryam Namazie

Maryam Namazie is an Iranian-born campaignen and writer, initiator of the Celebrating Dissent conferences and spokesperson of Council of Ex-Muslims of Britain and One Law for All. She has faced censorship for her activism and has earned multiple awards.



Milad Resaeimanesh

Milad Resaeimanesh chairs the Central Committee of Ex-Muslims in Scandinavia and hosts a weekly television program, promoting secular values and community support for ex-Muslims.



Mimzy

Mimzy is a life coach and counselor who helps individuals overcome trauma and redefine their identities after leaving religion, sharing her experiences through her YouTube channel.

Rana Ahmad

Rana Ahmad is an ex-Muslim activist from Saudi Arabia who fled under threat for her beliefs. She advocates for women's freedom and founded Atheist Refugee Relief to help those facing similar threats.



Sami Abdallah

Sami Abdallah is President of Freethought Lebanon, advocating for secular rights in the Arab world. His work focuses on protecting dissidents and promoting critical thinking in the region.



Sanal Edamaruku

Sanal Edamaruku is an Indian rationalist and author known for his activism against superstition. He has faced threats for his work and continues advocating for rationalist thought from Finland.
